

Federal Funding Boosts St. Thomas & Elgin County's Response to the Opioid Crisis

We are pleased to announce that the City of St. Thomas will receive a federal investment in the amount of \$640,326 over two years through Health Canada's Emergency Treatment Fund to strengthen local responses to opioid-related harms in St. Thomas and Elgin County. In addition to the City of St. Thomas, a collaborative network of Elgin Ontario Health Team members, including The Inn Out of the Cold St. Thomas Elgin (The INN), Southwestern Public Health, St. Thomas Elgin General Hospital, Canadian Mental Health Association Thames Valley Addictions and Mental Health Services and Central Community Health Centre will provide leadership for this work.

This investment will support community-led initiatives that expand access to mental health, substance use, and addictions services, enhance local service capacity, and improve culturally safe support for those most affected.

More specifically, the funding will:

- Facilitate shelter site modifications at **The INN** to enhance its role as a service hub and expand outreach efforts to connect people to services.
- Provide training to local providers and peer supporters to offer "one-at-a-time" counselling and brief action planning for faster access to mental health and addictions counselling.
- Train local providers and peer supporters in trauma-informed approaches to support safer, more responsive care, and initiate a Community of Practice to move learning into action.
- Enhance local capacity for culturally safe approaches to healing and wellness for guests at The INN who identify as Indigenous.
